## Languages in the District of Columbia

- The District of Columbia's 79 languages tied for the 35 th highest number recorded in any county in the United States.
- The District of Columbia has the highest percentage of speakers of Amharic, Bulgarian, Croatian, Fulani, Jamaican Creole and Krio in the United States. The nation's capital also ranks second in the percentage of Burmese, Kru/Ibo/Yoruba, Malay, Nepali, Slovene and Swahili speakers and third in the percentage of African, Bantu, Efik, Swedish and Turkish speakers.
- The District of Columbia has the fifth highest percentage of Amharic speakers of any county in the nation. Other languages that rank highly in the District of Columbia include: Jamaican Creole (fifth) and Krio (eighth).
